MEET PETE & KATHI DOW SOUTHERN CHAPTER

Pete Dow is the new editor of The Gauge, the newsletter for the Southern Ohio chapter. He and his wife Kathi have been married for 42 years with two children and four grandchildren. They have not always lived in Ohio. Pete grew up in New York, and Kathi near St. Louis. They first met at work in Delaware, Ohio and have moved many times since then, including to Quincy, Illinois and Bel Air, Maryland. They must hold some sort of record as they have lived at 14 different addresses during their marriage!

Pete retired in 2012 from Hobart Corporation in Troy after 29 years. He held a variety of positions in procurement and manufacturing operations, finally serving as Director of Strategic Sourcing for the company's 14 plants in North America. He travelled extensively during his career, both domestically and throughout Europe and Asia. He took his 8 year old son with him once on a business trip to Taiwan, and Kathi to Europe three times and Mexico once. All that travel was enough to make him fed-up with airlines, so he has not set foot on an airplane since retirement.

Upon retiring, Pete set out to restore a 1962 Buick Skylark convertible, just like his first car in 1968. He found a complete example in Chicago on eBay. The car was sent to a local restoration shop, but Pete was able to do most of the restoration work himself. Metal work, engine rebuilding, and paint were left to the professionals, but he did the rest. Kathi sewed the new interior. This was pretty much a full time job for him after retirement, and a big-time education. Four years later, it was done. Kathi spends her time in retirement playing piano, sewing, and knitting while Pete sees to his cars.

The Buick is not a valuable car, but Pete says he feels 16 again when behind the wheel. It is rather rare as you don't often see one, and almost never in restored condition. This is understandable as there are precious few parts available. Thank heavens for eBay and the internet! It took two donor cars to complete the project. The car has won several significant awards including a Preservation Award at the Dayton Concourse, and Best GM at the Children's Miracle Network show in Cincinnati. The car is driven regularly on AACA outings and elsewhere. Pete now has a 1961 VW Beetle at the same restoration shop, and similarly did as much of the work himself as he could. The body is painted and almost ready to come home for assembly. He hopes to have it on the road this summer. This, he says, is his last project.

Pete & Kathi have enjoyed their association with the Southern Ohio chapter and many new friends.





January 21, 2023

President Doug Seybold called the meeting to order at 2:10pm.

Secretary's minutes and Treasurer's report were approved by the members

NATIONAL: Carole Bernard received another National award for the Sparkplug.

COMMITTEES:

Spark Plug: (Cindy Robish) – Requested that all info from the chapters be in by 3-1-23.

Historian: (Nora Schreel) – She has not started any revisions on the Meet Guidelines yet

Webmaster: (Ron Taylor) – Joe Gagliano reported that Ron is willing to handle the website for 2023 but we will need to find someone new to take his place.

Legislative: (Keith Pretorius) – Joe Gagliano reported that Keith is permanently in CA and that we should find someone new to take his place.

OLD BUSINESS:

- Don Sword reported that dates for Regional tour have been published in the AACA magazine. Tour will consist of 3 days of touring with an early bird tour on Wednesday for those participants that arrive early.
- Denny Robish had emailed the suggested revisions of the Constitution and Bylaws to the board members and asked if there were any questions. No one brought up any issues. Motion was made by Vicki Hughes to accept the changes to the Bylaws, seconded by Linda Sneary; voted and passed.

SOUTHERN CHAPTER Nora Schreel Pete Dow



History Time: Who was Oscar Ulysses Zerkowitz, and what did he have to do with automobiles?

So, who was Oscar Ulysses Zerknowitz? Oscar was born in 1878 in Vienna Austria, the son of a textile manufacturer. Around 1897 (19 years old), he invented a machine that utilized punch cards and "electric devices" to arrange the thread colors to create various woven patterns for the textile busi-This machine took the place of 12 workers. ness. He then applied to the Engineering and Textile College at Bruenn. He was turned down, then he appealed to the Austrian Emperor (Franz Josef), who was so impressed with him that he immediately agreed that the youth be admitted to the College. After graduation in 1901, he went to Bradford, England to work in the textile industry where he developed and improved his weaving machinery. Four years in England then back to Austria where he turned his attention to the automobile. He designed the first six-cylinder motor car and later a forerunner of the automatic transmission. Time to come to the U.S.A (1907). He worked for White Steamer" for about 5 years in Cleveland, Ohio. Back to Austria, then back to U.S.A. in 1913, he changed his last name to Zerk and while on the ocean trip he came up with the idea for a new and vastly improved system for auto lubrication. Oscar formed a company in Cleveland and employed as many as 500 people and had contracts with virtually all automakers. Believe it or not, the fittings were called Zerk fittings and they replaced the Alemite Fittings, that had been used. A year later, he lost control of the business and sold out to Alemite. The fittings used today are similar to the Zerk fittings, but they have been changed to have the 'ball' on the end to hold onto the grease gun. After he sold the business, Oscar went back to Austria and got drafted into World War I. After the War, he married Maria Brahnaplatz and then back to the U.S.A. He ended up in Kenosha, Wisconsin in a mansion he remodeled, called "Done Movin". Oscar Zerk is credited with over 300 inventions ranging from textile weaving, leg shaping hose, trolley brakes, decontaminating systems to wash soldiers coming out of trenches in World War1, the first six-cylinder internal combustion engine and lubrication systems that would be the standard for automobiles worldwide. And vou just thought he made grease fittings!

Be safe, drive carefully, wash your hands, get vaccinated and boosted, and we will see you on the flip side.

The roots of the Western Reserve Chapter, A.A.C.A. actually took hold way back in 1969.

In the Fall of 1969, Mr. Bud Klingler, a member of the Vintage Chevrolet Club of America, called for a meeting of anyone in the area that owned old Chevrolets, or had an interest in them. This meeting was held in the basement of the Geneva First Federal Savings & Loan-a location that our later Western Reserve Chapter used for many January events. Bud Klingler and his wife chaired the meeting-and it was their sole desire to form a local chapter of Vintage Chevrolet Club (V.C.C.A.) as the closest Chevy Chapter was in the Southwest Cleveland area.

Two of those in attendance were Bob Neubacher and Dave Payne. I had met Bob only one time before, at the Ashtabula Downtown Merchants Fall Festival Car Show of 1968. In any event, it turned out that Bob and I had gone to that meeting with exactly the same idea in mind. Bob got up and declared that there were just not enough people in the area that were interested in Chevies only. He felt, and I agreed, that we should form a club of all antique car makes. Bud Klingler was still in favor of a Chevy Club, but was willing to go along with the idea.

As I remember, he appointed Bob to seek out other people in his area (Geneva and West) and I said that I would locate people from Ashtabula and East. We ran several articles in the newspapers, and did several photo sessions, with articles featuring Dick Mead, Joe Hassett, Bob Neubacher, and Dave Payne, and their cars. This was in the Winter of 1969-70.

The initial meetings were held in the meeting room of the Ashtabula Telephone Company, Park Avenue, with Dick Mead as acting chairman (since he worked there). By the second meeting, we had over 50 people in attendance, some from Painesville and Mentor. We had originally figured on an all—Ashtabula County Club—but quickly added Lake and parts of Geauga Counties, the areas that our Western Reserve Chapter encompasses today.

The fledging club grew very quickly, with one of the primary goals being to select a name for the group. This club was to be strictly local, with no other affiliation. By the second or third meeting at the Telephone Company, a name was chosen. Submitted by Joanne Ray, and overwhelmingly approved, the club became the Yesteryear Auto Club—with annual dues set at \$5.00. It was the very first time, during early 1972, that we were approached with the idea of joining A.A.C.A., the Ohio Region, and forming a new chapter thereof. Up to this time, many of us had never even heard of A.A.C.A.!! There were many people who did not want to join a larger organization, and therefore dropped out completely.

Some of us decided to pursue the idea of joining A.A.C.A. At that time it took seven members to form a Chapter. After the Ohio Region announced to National the intent to form a new chapter seven people signed up as Charter Members of the Western Reserve Chapter, in the late Fall of 1972. One of the stipulations of the Region's forming a new Chapter, was that Bob Babcox become the first Chapter President, since he had had the most affiliation with the Ohio Region at that time.

The other charter members were: Ed Robinson, Rod Stemen, Bob Neubacher, Dave Payne, Norm Thorpe, and Paul Herr, from Northern Chapter, who handled all the paper work for submission to National. On November 5, 1972, we held our first meeting at Unionville Tavern, where we were presented our Charter by Howard and Gladys Wyles, President and First Lady of the Ohio Region, and who were members of the Northern Chapter.

At that time, no one in the infant Chapter knew anything about putting on an Ohio Region Meet, except Bob Babcox, Rod Stemen, and Bob Neubacher. We were all a little horrified to find out that the very first meet we were "given" to host was the Winter Assembly in January, 1974. However, it came off with very few hitches, and was the first of the Region Meets held at Quail Hollow Motel, Concord Township.

The Chapter has come a long way since the Chapter was formed, and many members have served as officers through the 50 years we have been a chapter.

Over the years, our Chapter has hosted a Spring Swap Meet, now over 40 years in existence, and for the last several years we have hosted a car

show at DeBonne Winery in Madison, Ohio, along with the winery. We have been on several overnight tours, including into Indiana. For many years, we had an annual picnic at Bill & Lois Shreves home where we played many car games using our cars, that were so much fun. Several years we had what we call a "Hobo stew" cooking everything that the members brought to the meetings over an open kettle pot over a wood fire. Many of our members have gone on Ohio Region Tours, Founder's Tours, and Glidden Tours. We have all truly had many, many, great tours and experiences with A.A.C.A. This is all just a sample of things we have done and enjoyed through all the 50 years.

Membership Corner: Brake Pads, Heaters and Wipers, OH MY!

Have you ever stopped to think about the important roles that women have played in the automotive industry? Where would the automobile be today if it weren't for the roles that women have played? Strong women have creative ideas, tenacity and those traits show in the roles they have played.

Bertha Benz – Brake Pads and the First "Road Trip" – Bertha took her children out for a long-distance trip in her husband's motorcar and during that trip the wooden brakes failed. Needing to find a solution to get her family safely home, she developed the first brake pad, made of leather.

Margaret Wilcox – Car Heater – In 1893, Margaret received a patent for the interior car heater that pulled heat from the engine into the vehicle for the passengers to be warm.

Mary Anderson and Charlotte Bridgwood – Windshield Wipers – While on a trolley ride and not able to look out the widow due to accumulating snow, Mary thought up a spring-loaded arm with a rubber blade that would wipe the windshield when activated from within the car. Charlotte took that design and updated it a mere 14 years later to be electrically operated and use rollers instead of a blade.

Florence Lawrence – Turn Signals – This very elementary design which raised and lowered a signal arm was placed on the back fender of the vehicle and would indicate a stop or a turn. The patent was never issued but certainly transpired into what we know today as turn signals and brake lights.

June McCarroll – Road Markings – While driving her Ford Model T down the roads of California, a tenton truck took a bit more of the roadway than she desired. It was then that she launched a letter writing campaign for painted lines, which became California law in 1924.

Gladys Mae West – GPS System – Gladys worked as a mathematician in the U.S. Naval Weapons Laboratory when she and her team built the GEOSAT satellite creating simulations of the earth's surface. This work on the GEOSAT and other satellite systems emerged into the GPS system we have today in our vehicles. This is certainly not an all-inclusive list of women's roles in the development and progression of the automobile, but it is of interest that many of the features mentioned above are safety features that are so important today.

How does this information tie into membership? When sharing your membership opportunities to new individuals, think outside the box and pay attention to the women who come to the shows and tours with their own vehicles. The teenager or young girl who is hanging out with their grandfather or father at the event you are hosting are our future. Those ladies, regardless of age, already have the automobile hobbyist spark, so don't miss the opportunity to recruit them into the best car club around.

THE OHIO REGION OF THE ANTIQUE AUTOMOBILE CLUB OF AMERICA CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this club, which is chartered by the Antique Automobile Club of America, and incorporated under the laws of the State of Ohio, shall be: THE OHIO REGION OF THE ANTIQUE AUTOMOBILE CLUB OF AMERICA. **ARTICLE II- PURPOSE**

SECTION 1

To organize those interested in the development and evolution of the automobile from its pioneer days; for the exchange and interchange of ideas, policies and matters of common interest in and the preservation and collection of antique automobiles and literature pertaining thereto; to foster under the influence of constructive purpose whose interests which tend to perpetuate the preservation of all material of whatever kind or nature, pertaining to the development of the automobile and to promote sociability among its members and the exchange of ideas helpful to the furtherance of this purpose. SECTION 2

Ohio Region of the Antique Automobile Club of America will operate in compliance with section 501-C-7 of the Internal Revenue Code.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1 - ACTIVE MEMBER

A member of the AACA National whose application for membership in the Ohio Region has been accepted and whose payment of Ohio Region dues has been received <u>each calendar year.</u>

SECTION 2 - SPOUSES OF MEMBERS

Membership in the Ohio Region of a married spouse of a member of AACA and Ohio Region is established by showing proof of spouse's membership in AACA and Ohio Region. No additional membership fee is required. <u>Non-Married</u> couples must provide and be living at the same address to be considered a "couple" and share a membership. If their address becomes separate they re no longer considered a "couple" and must have individual memberships. SECTION 2A JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP - Membership in the Ohio Region of a Junior member of AACA is established by showing proof of Junior's membership in AACA. No additional membership fee is required to be a member of Ohio Region as a Junior.

SECTION 3 - SUSPENSIONS

Any member may be suspended or expelled by the Board of Trustees (hereinafter referred to as "Board") for failure to pay dues or for conduct not for the best interest of the club. An expelled member is not entitled to any refund of dues. SECTION 4 - APPEALS

Any member suspended by the Board shall have the right to appeal the decision of the Board to the membership and upon his written request the Secretary shall call a special meeting of the members to consider such appeal.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

SECTION 1 - The annual meeting of the members of the Ohio Region shall be held in January of each year at a time and place designated in notice following an election of officers in accordance with ARTICLE VI - SECTION 3.

SECTION 2 - Dates and location of other regularly called meetings shall be left to the discretion of the Board. SECTION 3 - Notice of business meetings shall be in writing and postmarked or provided electronically i.e. Email at least five days prior to date of meeting.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS

SECTION 1- The elected officers of the Region shall be President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President. Appointed officers are the Secretary and Treasurer.

SECTION 2 - The Board shall consist of trustees selected by the various chapters in accordance with ARTICLE VI, the President of each chapter, any resident member of the Ohio Region serving on the National Board, and all of the elected Officers of the Region named in SECTION 1 ARTICLE V. No member may hold more than one of the above titles at any time except a National Board Member, **and also the appointed officers of the board, who have no voting rights.** SECTION 3 - An executive Board may be created, consisting of the four Officers and two or more trustees appointed by the Board.

SECTION 4 - The Board shall have full and complete authority to conduct and manage the affairs of the club and its property, and shall adopt rules of procedure or by-laws to guide the officers and others in carrying out their duties and responsibilities.

SECTION 5 - The Board may appoint or approve the appointment of special committees for specific purposes and delegate such authority as the Trustees may deem advisable.

SECTION 6 - The Board shall determine the amount of annual dues, that is payable to the Region by each member. SECTION 7 - Each chapter shall fill any vacancies for unexpired terms from among the trustees it has elected.

ARTICLE VI - ELECTIONS

SECTION 1 -The Board of the Ohio Region shall consist of one trustee for each fifty Chapter members and additional fraction of fifty as of June 30th of the preceding year according to the Region Treasurer. Each chapter shall have at least one trustee.

SECTION 2 - Chapters will elect the appropriate number of trustees according to their own Constitution and By-Laws by December 31st of each year. Trustees will serve a normal term of three years.

SECTION 3 - The newly-constituted Board shall then meet prior to the Annual Meeting and select from their own group, or from a group consisting of Ohio Region members who have had at least two years membership on the Board preceding the election being held, (a) a President, (b) a First Vice-President, and (c) a Second Vice-President for the coming year. The President designate shall then choose a Secretary and a Treasurer, subject to the approval of the Board. The presidency of the Region shall be rotated among the Region's chapters in accordance with Region By-Laws.

SECTION 4 - The new officers shall assume their responsibilities at the conclusion of the Annual Meeting and the retiring officers shall turn over to their successors any club records or property which may be in their possession. **ARTICLE VII - OUORUM**

SECTION 1 - Those members present at any regularly called membership meeting shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2 - Fifty percent of the Region Board shall constitute a quorum for that body.

ARTICLE VIII - AMENDMENTS

SECTION 1 - The constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the members casting ballots by mail, or E-Mail within a 30 day period or the period stipulated on the ballot, providing notice of the proposed change has been submitted to the membership by mail, email and / or at the previous regularly called meeting.

SECTION 2 - The ballots shall be mailed to and counted by, a committee of three tellers appointed by the President. **ARTICLE IX - RULES OF ORDER**

SECTION 1 - The Board shall at all times conduct the affairs of the club in a business-like manner, to preserve and perpetuate its existence.

SECTION 2 - The members shall have the right to void any act on the part of the Board, which may not be for the best interest of the club, by a majority vote of all members in good standing at the time the action to rescind is begun. ARTICLE X - CHAPTERS

SECTION 1 - The Board may give authority to any local group of qualified members to create a Chapter within the structure of the Ohio Region. Application must then be made to AACA National. The Chapter shall consist of duly elected officers including Ohio Region Trustee(s), have its own Treasury and an assistant editor to the Spark Plug. **ARTICLE XI - OBLIGATION TO AACA**

(The following is drawn from the Present AACA Constitution and Rules of Order. Rules under its current constitution shall have precedence over rules which have been revised.)

SECTION 1 - DUES UNDER CHARTER:

The local Region shall not assess per capita dues in excess of 1 1/2 times the dues assessed by the National AACA Organization per annum, for its local purpose.

SECTION 2 - Any publication or newspaper issued or published under the supervision or guidance of the local Region shall be limited to items of local interest and shall not contain such items and articles which in the opinion of the National Directors do not meet the general guidelines as defined in the National Policy and Procedure manual and specific newsletter topics.

SECTION 3 - At all times, the local Region and members thereof shall not in any way, shape or form conduct their activities contrary to the Constitution and By-laws of the National Organization.

SECTION 4 - Activities of the Region in which antique cars will be displayed, must have the sanction of the VP National Activities AACA, in order to prevent conflicts with similar events to be held by the National Region or other Regions.
