Well, Mother Nature sure didn't disappoint us with the weather! It was warm and sunny for the weekend! And Ohio Region didn't disappoint us either! We had 51 registrations for the weekend! Unfortunately, due to health reasons we didn't see a few of these members, but it was still an awesome turnout. Thank you!

We started out with the Early Bird heading to Winesburg to Glenn & Christi Wengerd's amazing residence which features Glenn's shop & garages, a bicycle museum, a Bed and Breakfast, a turn of the century home, and much, much more! Glenn painted Robish's 1940 Buick Century, which was in his garage. And if you walked around, while eating your popcorn, and checked out the trunk you would have seen a 1940 Buick pedal car that Glenn painted with the leftover paint!

Some members also checked out the Antique Shop next door. It was nice to see cars lining the street and filling a parking lot behind Wengerd's.

Friday night, Cindy Robish was amazed at the turnout for her computer class. A big shout out to Linda Muth for demonstrating online software call CANVA which is a great tool for creating flyers.

Saturday, we started out bright and early and went to Mason's residence. Jon has three 2 story carriage houses with beautiful chandeliers housing his incredible car collection of around 100 cars. Auburns, Duesenbergs, Stuts, many American makes, and a 1949 Buick Roadmaster which was in the movie "Rain Man".

The next stop was David Warther's ivory carvings of ships. David has been carving ships since the age of six! David starting carving string for his ships at the age of 14. A friend in high school made a block with groves in shop class and David uses that technique yet today to carve the string for the ships. His friend makes him a new block about every 8-9 years. This is a delicate process and about 60% of the string he files down don't make it. He told us many stories about his carvings.

Lunch consisting of Subway sandwiches, chips, fruit & brownies was served in Sugarcreek.

Erb's Coleman Museum seemed to be a hit with our members. He has more than 3,000 Coleman items, including actual gasoline cooking stoves, ice chests, vintage advertising, lanterns, drink coolers, popcorn machine, washer & dryer set, and a motorbike. He also had a couple tables of old irons...and I mean tables FULL of irons.

Our last stop was at the Age of Steam Roundhouse which features a fully operational 18-stall brick roundhouse and a 115-foot turntable. Our members have garages for our cars, this is a "garage" full of 22 steam engines. Jerry Jacobson bought his first railroad, the Ohio Central in 1988. Jerry sold the railroad in 2008, which gave him the seed money to build the Roundhouse, which was complete in 2010. There are smoke jacks in the white oak timber ceiling to get rid of the smoke when the trains are running. These jacks weigh 2000 pounds each! Our guide gave us interesting tidbits about each of the trains. One engine was put up for scrap metal for \$10,000. Jerry won the bid, but it cost him another \$90,000 to move it to Sugarcreek. It has been restored and now sits proudly in the Roundhouse. Engine 1278 was featured in the movie Funny Girl with Barbara Streisand, her sister, engine 1293, was featured in the movie Terror Train and on the album cover of the Doobie Brothers "Long Train Running" remix of 93.

After a little time to rest, we headed to Dutch Valley Restaurant for our closing banquet.

Thanks goes out to Lytles and Gaglianos for directions for both days and Denny Robish for being chairman of the meet. Phil Westhafer did a great job of parking cars. Mary Gagliano found tasty food for lunch and Jen Hartzler stepped right up to help. Mary also did a fantastic job setting up the Hospitality Room. Mary Anne Sebak did an amazing job on her first time with registration. To all the members who donated items for the raffle baskets, and the ladies, Sue Bussard, Lou Cox, Ethel Halas, Vicki Hughes and Cindy Robish for putting the baskets together. The meeting of the Ohio Region board of trustees and officers was held at the Comfort Inn/Quality Inn, Dover, OH. President Joe Gagliano called the meeting to order at 9:10 pm.

PRESENT: Joe Gagliano, Bill Lytle, Vicki Hughes, Denny Robish, Cindy Robish, Phil Westhafer, Bill Bird, Doug Seybold, Ronnie Seybold, Glen Jugenheimer, Craig Bernard, Jeff Smith, Don Sword, Nora Schreel, Fred Schreel, Walt Elliott, Dave Payne, Shirley Payne (for Linda Sneary).

SECRETARY'S REPORT: (Nora Schreel) - Phil Westhafer made a motion to accept the minutes as printed in the Spark Plug or email, seconded by Doug Seybold; voted on and approved.

TREASURER'S REPORT: (Shirley Payne for Linda Sneary) - Balance in checking account is \$8,917.71 in checking and \$2,000.02 in CD. Income of \$1,155.00. Expenses of \$441.70. Denny Robish made a motion to accept the report, seconded by Doug Seybold; voted on and approved.

CORRESPONDENCE: None

NATIONAL: Joe reported that rumors that the Hershey Swap Meet was going to be cancelled in the future are not true.

COMMITTEES:

Spark Plug: (Cindy Robish) – Stated that bill for latest for Spark Plug was just turned in and not included in latest financial report. She requested info for the Spark Plug, such as, information on members, special interest collections of members, any technical information that would be of interest for club members or anything car related.

Historian: (Nora Schreel) – Decided that Meet packets would be handed out at Winter Meeting so members wouldn't have to deal with them at the Fall Meet. It was also determined that the "Meet Guidelines" will be changed to "Meet Suggestions" and will be ready for review at the Winter Meeting.

Webmaster: (Ron Taylor) – Nothing in his absence. Joe suggested that each chapter should supply new pictures to Ron to update the website. Joe also said that he cannot find out who is the administrator of the "Ohio Region" Facebook page and questioned other members if they knew. No one responded. When asked if any other chapters had a Facebook page Southern responded with a yes and it is an "open" page. Western Reserve also has a Facebook page but it is "closed" membership.

Legislative: (Denny Robish) CA has added a law that now recognizes cruise in's. Congress is considering the "Repair Act". This legislation is essential to retaining our ability to fix and or modify our cars in the future. Without this legislation the OEM's will be able to keep the electronics used in today's cars as proprietary which would render us unable to restore a car. Or even to repair a car. It would have to be taken to a dealership for repairs. A motion was made by Doug Seybold to follow thru with contacting Congress regarding this issue. Seconded by Vicki Hughes, voted on and approved. Denny will send a link to Board Members to forward to membership to be able to contact their Congressional representative regarding this issue.

MEET REGISTRATIONS: (Forgot to obtain at meeting).

OLD BUSINESS: Don Sword from Southern reported that the AACA Regional Tour was a big success with 40 registrations. Joe reported that he contacted national AACA about website and stated they updated the site and made sure Ron Taylor has the most current files needed to update his system.

Joe reported that he had contacted his local high school about getting assistance with the web page and was told they couldn't help due to school polices.

Joe also called the head of the Kent State Computer Science Dept. for assistance, but no response to date.

NEW BUSINESS: Joe reported that the Canton Chapter was below 50 members as of June 30, 2023 and, therefore, will lose one of their trustees for 2024.

Joe reported that he has 4 free National memberships as president that would be available for any chapter that uses up their own free memberships.

Larry O'Neal passed on Wed., September 13, 2023, peacefully at Hospice House of Youngstown. He was born Dec. 11, 1931, in Youngstown. He is the son of Earl & Agnes Kirkwood O'Neal, & was a lifelong area resident. He graduated from South High School class of 1949. He also was a graduate

from Youngstown College with a bachelors in business, where he met the love of his life, Joann Fabian.

They married on July 4, 1956, & were married for 60 years before her passing in 2016. He was also enlisted in the Army during the Korean War.

Larry was one of a kind, always offering help when needed, and never saying no to a challenge. He loved to entertain with his wife by his side, and was always creative in everything he did. He loved spending time with his family whether for a family dinner or on vacation, and loved sharing his knowledge of old cars and history with them. His favorite pastime was his antique cars. Restoring and touring with them throughout the years. He and his wife Joann participated in nine transcontinental tours in North America, driving across the United States and Canada, and two tours in England and Ireland. All driving his 1912 Red Cadillac, restored and maintained by Larry. Larry also toured with his 1915 Model T manv other often including tours. his family in his love for the hobby. Larry also enjoyed skiing in his younger years, introducing his entire family and anyone else he could to the sport. Larry was one of the founding members of St. Michels Boy Scout Troop 115, of which his co-founders would become his lifelong friends. Larry was also a founding member of the Meander Antique Car Club, planning some spectacular tours and entertainment for their participants, even enacting a faux circus with an inflatable elephant at one of the banquets.

Larry O'Neal ran & operated O'Neal Tarpaulin & Awning Company in Youngstown, for 50 years. During his time there he invented and patented the AirLocke Dock Seal (an inflated dock

seal on loading dock doors). He also was president of the regional Professional Awning Manufacturers Association. If you go for an MRI in an off-site trailer, you will pass through an AirLocke dock seal. And if you remember the space shuttle in the 1980's, you will also see an AirLocke Dock Seal where the astronauts enter the shuttle. Larry would always give JoAnn credit for his idea of inflating things after she asked him to put a large, inflatable snowman in the front yard for Christmas one year.

Larry leaves behind his son Dan (Tula Arfaras) O'Neal; and daughter Marijo O'Neal (Marty) Rischar, granddaughters Erin (Kyle) Dickey, Haley and Shannon Rischar; grandson Daniel (Jessica) O'Neal, and his great granddaughter Claire Dickey. Larry was preceded in death by his father and mother Earl and Agnes (Kirkwood) O'Neal, his wife Joann (Fabian) O'Neal and son Greg (Christine) O'Neal.

THEY WILL BE MISSED



George Duncan Strom passed away on September 14, 2023. George, 83, was born August 23, 1940 at Elyria Memorial Hospital to Egan and Blanche Duncan Strom. He was a 1958 graduate of Elyria High School and a resident of Elyria his entire life only moving to

Knoxville, TN this May to be near family. But his heart was in Elyria, and he continued to be one of Elyria's best and most vocal cheerleaders.

George's inquiring mind and warm heart led him through a lifetime of good friendships and accomplishments. He could be described as many things—a loving husband, historian, antique collector, teacher, developer and salesman. One of George's favorite phrases was, "Have I got a deal for you!" And he always did—whether it was a great story or an intriguing history lesson or something special for sale.

George was president of the Lorain County Historical Society (LCHS) for over 15 years and a member of the Board of Directors from 1963 to 1991. Otto Schoepfle, long-time editor of the Chronicle Telegram, said that George shepherded the Lorain County Historical Society from infancy through its adolescent years and into adulthood. In addition, George's love of antiques, history, and cars came together in his work with antique car clubs. George was president of Elyria's antique car club for a number of years and served one year as president of the Ohio Region of the Antique Automobile Club of America.

In the business world, George combined his love of history and antiques when he established Lamplight, Inc. in 1981. Operations began by fully restoring and updating truck loads of antique municipal lighting and installing them all over northern Ohio. Under his leadership, the growing company placed beautiful period architectural streetlamps for municipalities from California to Cleveland and on many college campuses including Baldwin Wallace and Ohio State. Lamplight, LLC is still operating today.



George greatly enjoyed singing in the choir there for many years. Mark & Winnie Lammlein opened their place of business, Great Lakes Tire Company, for our September Meeting.

After filling our tummies with some great food, Mark told us a little about their company. Mark has been in business for about 20 years.

Dave Andrews, Sales Director did a great presentation telling us more about the business. In 1958 the first tire was produced at the Guizhou Tyre Company in China. The company employees 10,000 employees. Most of the tires are for medium sized trucks, the ones with 18 wheels.

There is now a factory in Vietnam also, Advance Tire, which is a subsidiary of Guizhou. They produce about 1.2 million sets of tires a year! The tires sold are OTR (Off the Road) and are mainly used for farm, backhoes, industrial, logging, lawn & Garden, and bus tires.

We were told "The best thing to purchase when buying new tires is an air gauge"!

Also they had a great number of clothes for hard working people for sale on the third floor. As an old guy who loves hardware stores, I gotta go back and spend more time at this one.

After our trip thru hardware wonderland, we traveled to Newbury Ohio to a restaurant called "Mangia Mangia". Mangia in Italian means "eat". I guess there should be no question as to what you are going to do at that restaurant. I think everyone had a take home box when they were leaving.

That did not deter me, got no welder, got no shear, borrowed a jig saw, bought an armload of bolts and "pop" rivets and a gallon of "Black Majic" body putty and here we go. Lots of blood, sweat and tears, and I had a cute little sports car with a beautiful "rattle can" primer paint job. I bought a gallon of Chrysler "Lime Green" paint and thinner. But I had no spray equipment. Low and behold, there was a "body shop" run by 3 hippies (it was the late 60's) on Tyler Boulevard Mentor. They agree to paint my Sprite for \$20.00, I'm all in. When I got it there I took off the license plate, 4 bolts and the windshield, lifted out the seat and pulled off the steering wheel, and they painted it. I turned out as Billy Crystal would say "Fabulous". Lots of assembly and I had a sports car.

When we arrived at the Class Body Shop there was an extreme realization that things just ain't the way they used to be. No hippies painting in an old garage with a window fan. This place is a world away from what was 50 years ago. Bill Raikes (member Dwain Raikes' son) gave us a tour of how cars are repaired and maintained today. As you enter the facility, you notice there is no paint odor, no dust, no window fans, no curtains around a paint area, no fixtures to hold a fender while beating dents out. How do they run this place? It seems that cars are built differently than in the "old days". The paint is now water based, fenders and doors are replaced only with OEM parts, no aftermarket. There are still paint booths, but the cars are put on dollies and brought into the booth by trolley tracks. Dust is vacuumed at the tools. There is almost no welding, as adhesives are used and special rivets as directed by individual manufacturers. There is even a special room for setting and aligning sensors and cameras. The times, they be a changing, and I hope we can keep up with them.

Okay, Henry Timken was an inventor and businessman who invented the tapered roller bearing and founded the Timken Roller Bearing Company. Why tapered bearings? When used in pairs, they can carry much more weight than bearings or ball bearings and withstand sidewards loads like an axle turning. The need arose with heavy freight wagons that were destroying ball bearings. The front wheels on rear wheel drive vehicles and the rear wheels on heavy trucks use Timken type bearings.




